## 80th Anniversary of D-Day: Thursday 2nd June 2024

On 6 June 1944, tens of thousands of soldiers landed on five beaches in Normandy, northern France.

The sixth of June is a date etched in the memories of generations as D-Day, the start of Operation Overlord, the Allied forces' full-scale liberation of France from Nazi Germany during World War Two. They gave us freedom by giving up their lives.

Mindful of the war in Europe raging 80 years later, today, in West Moors, we paid tribute to the sacrifices that were made in combat before, on and after that day.

As our way of remembering, the Council hosted a FREE fish and chip lunch and cakes; between us and Lime Coast Catering, for those residents that asked to attend.

Gathering at Pinehurst Community Church was a lovely group of 61 residents including residents from Brook View and Summer Hill Care Homes.

There were some new and familiar faces from West Moors, that joined in with waving of D-Day Flags and singing along to melodies from the '40's, performed by The Land Girls.

Everyone present, understood the significance of the day, even though there were no veterans amongst them (we think), there were guests who had parents or grandparents, in the war, or were evacuated because of the war, or remembered where they were, on D-Day, when troops were faced with the most shocking scenes one could never imagine.

Following the lunch, some then met at the Petwyn War Memorial, where the Town Crier, Iain Mitchell, read out the D-Day Proclamation, and a short service was led by Revd Michael Eaton; Revd Lynne Morris recited The Exhortation, and the Chair of the Town Council, Cllr Rita Burke laid a wreath of remembrance. The D-Day Flag was flown till the following week, in honour and gratitude of those who have gone, but not been forgotten.

Thank you to Pastor Adam Parrett of Pinehurst Community Church for his support all day and to Cllrs Trevor Salt, Jim Staig and Cllr Mrs Rita Burke for their help throughout the event. Lest We Forget, let's be thankful, and let's hope there is soon peace, where there is currently war.

### **Goodbye and Thank You Clir Alex Clarke**

At the Annual Town Council meeting on Thursday 16th May, members said their goodbyes to ClIr Alex Clarke who chose not to stand for Councillor this year, in order to make time for his many other commitments. Members presented former ClIr Alex Clarke with a card, gift and their sincere thanks, for his time and work on the council, over the many years.

Since joining in 1991, Alex Clarke has contributed a vast amount.

Having served on various committees such as the then Playing Fields & Cemeteries Committee, Finance, Highways, etc, he became Chairman of Council in 2008. In 2009, he decided to take a step back so he could focus on his East Dorset District Councillor role (EDDC) (for which he was elected in 1994), although he still attended Parish meetings to give the monthly report from EDDC.

Alex moved to West Moors in 1990 with his wife and young daughters, as West Moors struck them as a great location to live. On their first visit, standing on the pavement outside St Mary's Church, they were immediately warmly welcomed by the Church Secretary who was cycling past. That clinched it – obviously a friendly place!

Alex explained, he always enjoyed his council work, using his knowledge of West Moors and his involvement with the local community to inform his contributions. He feels it has been both interesting and fulfilling to be a member of his local council, working with fellow councillors who wish the best for West Moors. In Alex's eyes, the council is going from strength to strength and the last five years are the best he has experienced since joining 33 years ago. He wishes the Council every success in the future.
