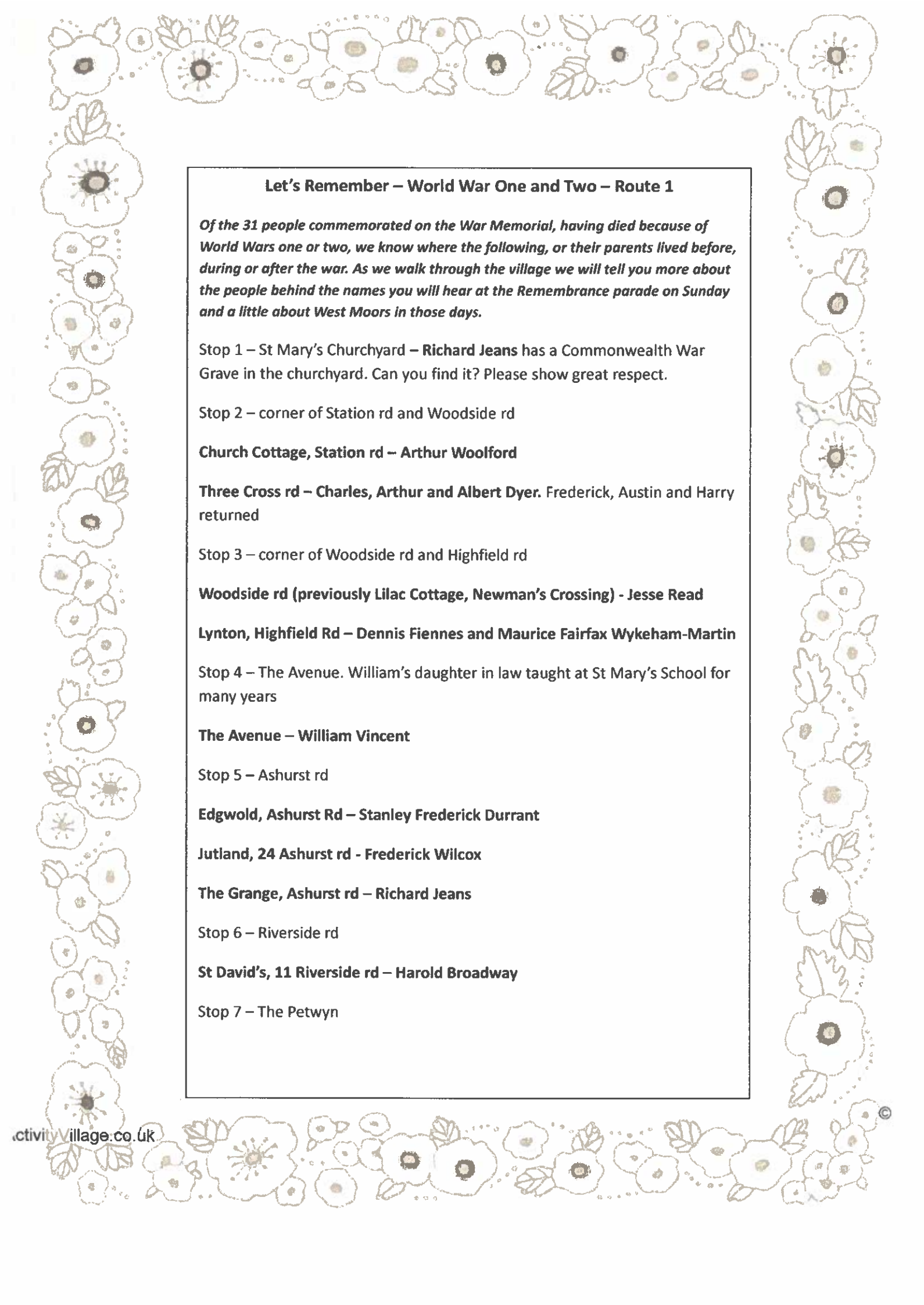

Of the 31 people commemorated on the War Memorial, having died because of World Wars one or two, we know where the following, or their parents lived before, during or after the war. As we walk through the village we will tell you more about the people behind the names you will hear at the Remembrance parade on Sunday and a little about West Moors in those days.

Stop 1 – St Mary's Churchyard – Richard Jeans has a Commonwealth War Grave in the churchyard. Can you find it? Please show great respect.

Stop 2 – corner of Station rd and Woodside rd

Church Cottage, Station rd – Arthur Woolford

Three Cross rd – Charles, Arthur and Albert Dyer. Frederick, Austin and Harry returned

Stop 3 – corner of Woodside rd and Highfield rd

Woodside rd (previously Lilac Cottage, Newman's Crossing) - Jesse Read

Lynton, Highfield Rd – Dennis Fiennes and Maurice Fairfax Wykeham-Martin

Stop 4 – The Avenue. William's daughter in law taught at St Mary's School for many years

The Avenue – William Vincent

Stop 5 – Ashurst rd

Edgwood, Ashurst Rd – Stanley Frederick Durrant

Jutland, 24 Ashurst rd - Frederick Wilcox

The Grange, Ashurst rd – Richard Jeans

Stop 6 – Riverside rd

St David's, 11 Riverside rd – Harold Broadway

Stop 7 – The Petwyn
